She brings a rich experience in research directions and practices by building on her recent projects: an AHRC network, *Children's Literature in Critical Contexts of Displacement: Exploring how story and arts-based practices create 'safe spaces'* and a British Academy project, *Strengthening Urban Engagement of Universities in Asia and Africa.* With her colleague, Sally Zacharias, she has developed a British Council project, *Challenging the Translingual Turn: Student-Teachers' Perceptions, Practices and Networks* and has recently coedited a book, *Rhetorical Machines: Writing, Code and Computational Ethics.* Dr. Hirsu is committed to explore language research in new and challenging contexts and will work towards supporting new

research developments by engaging with appropriate bodies and sharing this information with colleagues.
